


Open Educational Resources (OER)

What is an OER?

An open educational resource can be a textbook, a course, a video, a podcast, a simulation, a case study, or any other learning materials available **openly**.

What differentiates an OER from other digital resources is that it can be widely distributed and adapted because it is **free** and not subject to the usual copyright restrictions. This openness is most often indicated by a Creative Commons licence.
